PRESIDENTIAL COMMENT A TIME FOR CHANGE

Our last annual Conference for 2024 was a hugely successful event with many current issues being debated through resolutions including, safeguarding; social media and mobile phones; classroom assistants; Leave of Absence; SEND Transformation; reviews; governance; Team Teach; health and wellbeing; EA training; standardised assessments; Early Career Teachers; Educational Psychologists and attendance and the EWS, to name but a few. We also saw the launch of our Disability Campaign led by Pauline Hurst, our UTU Disability champion, and had representatives from EA on our panel, who took questions from the floor.

I would like to thank our ex-President Lynelle Fenton for the organisation of the Conference and for her year in office and welcome Janice Mullan into the role of Vice-President.

The Conference came at a time when the education system had finally recognised the need for teachers' salaries to gain parity with other regions across the United Kingdom. The **'together we are stronger'** campaign saw the strike action having the necessary effect, forcing politicians back to Stormont for them to put pressure on EA and DE. The three-year pay offer was welcomed by a large majority of our members and others across the NITC and would come to fruition in teachers' May pay. Alongside this came a pledge to engage in the Workforce Reviews, ratified and agreed on 31st May. Much work has been done by our union and the NITC on your behalf.

Alas, this change merely scratches the surface with still no funding for education as a whole and schools missing out on restoration and building offers that had previously been made. Other issues, including the arbitrary cuts to programmes that are vital if we educators are to cater for the ever-complex needs of the young people in our care as well as better conditions, are still a fight for all unions to undertake and we at UTU are proud to be your voice on all matters.



It is with mixed emotions that I announce my resignation as President of the union. I have been offered a new opportunity to serve as SENCO (Special Educational Needs Coordinator) at Ballyclare Secondary School, a role I am passionate about and deeply committed to. However, as many of you know, it requires complete dedication in the current educational environment. While I am excited to take on this new challenge, I regret that it means stepping down from my position in the union. It has been an honour to represent you at events across the province, Europe, and internationally, and a privilege to work in a union with such a dedicated staff and hardworking CEC. They are all amazing! I sincerely thank you all for your support during my time as President, and I hope to continue contributing to our shared goals in other ways.

Your dedication and hard work for the young people, in schools across Northern Ireland, is a constant source of inspiration to us all and we have the utmost respect for the fabulous teaching and learning that you are undertaking daily. Thank you.



GENERAL SECRETARY FOREWORD

Colleagues

The new term is now well underway and it's as if the summer is a distant memory!

I'm sure you have hit the ground running – and we have been no different in UTU HQ on your behalf.

This is the first UTU News that we have had since our co-ordinated action and I would like to take this opportunity to once again commend and thank all of you who participated in pickets, rallies, media and awareness raising around the on-going difficulties faced by teachers and schools. The voice of UTU was a significant one, and played a huge role in highlighting issues to DE and the employers resulting in a significant pay increase and a rejuvenation of the relevance and impact of union – particularly UTU – membership.

But as you enter school buildings and settings each day you will continue to be well aware that that victory signified the beginning of the struggle and not the end. We continue to face huge pressures such as SEN provision, lack of funding and resources and teacher shortage. We also have outstanding issues on workload to address – and the pay issue is back on the agenda.

So where are we? To begin with, we have had initial engagement with DE about the pay claim for this year with the group which negotiates teachers' pay due to meet next week. This is not likely to be a quick fix but the move to action last time will counsel the employers against dragging their heels in the same fashion as before and the point about timely resolution will be clearly made. We have seen moves towards resolution across the water, and there is some level of commitment around public sector pay in the Programme for Government; all of these factors can be brought to bear to make progress.

Yet we are well aware that, whilst pay is important as we watch our profession haemorrhaging members to other better paid jurisdictions, the issue of crippling workload is what remains to the front of many minds. We in UTU, and indeed NITC, are well aware of this and we have met with the employers frequently since August to establish how, on a practical level, we will translate the Workforce Review recommendations into systems and practices which will actually make an impact in schools. Patience is wearing thin – in your case and ours – and seeing no progress in the near future would be completely unacceptable. You can be assured that we continue to advocate strongly on your behalf and will engage you fully on decisions as we move forward.

The summer of discontent which we have just experienced in wider society has brought other issues to the fore in terms of the teaching profession and school staff which also require urgent attention. School leaders, teachers, classroom assistants and all other support staff are renowned for the support and attention they give to the children in their care and their particular needs outside of delivering teaching and



learning. We go above and beyond on a shoestring to cater for very particular additional needs of our children and young people which arise from SEN provision, disability, sexual orientation, domestic abuse and poverty to name but a few. However, those who work in the education system in NI do not appear to be afforded the same rights and protections. We have teachers and school leaders who are struggling to access reasonable adjustments for disabilities. We have members who have experienced, and are experiencing, low and high level bullying and harassment, often on equality grounds, from sources both within and outside the workplace. Such harassment is happening both physically and on-line. And this behaviour is going largely unchecked.

UTU, through our Disability Champion Pauline Hurst, is driving forward the disability agenda and this is paying dividends with more and more members stepping forward to seek advice and support. This work will continue this year. But every teacher and school leader has the right to be supported and work in safety, free from harassment in their workplace. Every teacher and school leader should have an expectation that unacceptable behaviour is addressed and that education has an approach such as health and retail – zero tolerance of abuse of staff.

UTU will be pushing this year to address this issue and seek accountability and action in relation to employers to create the same safety standards for schools as are evident in other workplaces. But we need your help.

We stood together for pay. We supported each other through Covid when times were very tough. Stand together with your colleagues on this issue, call out unacceptable behaviour and support each other in the workplace whilst we work to get the system changed.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE 2024 TIME FOR CHANGE

The Ulster Teachers' Union Annual Conference took place at the Roe Park Hotel in Limavady, and was attended by 250 guests and delegates. This annual event is an opportunity for teachers to come together to discuss and vote on resolutions that affect teaching in Northern Ireland. This year's Conference covered a wide range of topics, including online learning platforms, social media, class sizes in nursery, funding for educational psychologists, special educational needs, operation encompass, foundation stage classroom assistants, additional funding for math outreach support, disability, menopause, area planning, pastoral care, technology in schools, and electric vehicles.

One of the key topics discussed was the use of online learning platforms and social media in education. Delegates debated the benefits and drawbacks of these platforms, and voted to recommend that schools should use them in a responsible and safe manner. The Conference also addressed the issue of class sizes in nursery, and called for the government to provide additional funding to reduce class sizes and improve the quality of education for young children. Another important issue discussed was the provision of support for teachers who are pregnant, adopting, or taking maternity or paternity leave. Delegates voted to recommend that schools should provide adequate support for teachers during these times, including flexible working arrangements and additional leave if needed. The other topics covered at the Conference included the need for additional funding for educational psychologists and Special Educational Needs, the importance of Operation Encompass in supporting children who are exposed to domestic abuse, and the role of foundation stage classroom assistants in providing support for young children. The Conference also called for appropriate school settings with sufficient funding, and for additional support for numeracy and maths outreach programs.

The evening session of the Conference saw the passing of the President's chain from Lynelle Fenton to Leigh McKay. A new Vice-President, Janice Mullan, who teaches in an EOTAS school in Strathfoyle, was also installed. These appointments reflect the ongoing commitment of the Ulster Teachers' Union to promoting the interests of teachers and improving the quality of education in Northern Ireland.

In conclusion, the Ulster Teachers' Union Conference provided an important opportunity for teachers to come together to discuss and vote on resolutions affecting teaching in Northern Ireland. The range of topics covered at the Conference reflects the diverse challenges facing teachers in the modern education system, and highlights the ongoing need for ongoing support and funding to ensure that teachers can continue to provide high-quality education for all students.













































































Daughter Honours Legacy of Former Fivemiletown College Principal and UTU President

Dr. John George Burrell, an esteemed educator, Past UTU President and former Fivemiletown High School Principal, left a lasting legacy through his innovative educational initiatives and extensive community projects. Celebrated for his dedication, he was awarded an MBE in 2022 and is fondly remembered by his family and community.

The late Dr. John George Burrell was often described by the ancient Irish term "duine ildánach," meaning "a man for all seasons." He was a multifaceted and learned individual, an esteemed educator who earned numerous awards, and a former Principal of Fivemiletown College. Above all, he was a devoted father. Dr. Burrell left a lasting legacy of community service, which was recognized with an MBE in March 2022 by the now King Charles. In a heartfelt tribute, his daughter June Murphy, also a UTU member, shared memories of her father's life. Born in Lurgan in 1937, John was the eldest of four siblings: Mollie, Gordon, and Elinor. His family fondly recalls his childhood filled with adventures, games, singing, and guitar playing with relatives in Lurgan.

John's teaching career began unexpectedly when he secured a scholarship to Queen's University and Stranmillis College in Belfast. This unique opportunity allowed him to pursue a degree while training to



become a teacher, igniting his passion for educational innovation.

After graduating, John met his future wife, Unetta. At 23, he became Vice-Principal of a school in Fivemiletown, the same year he married Unetta. They enjoyed 47 wonderful years together until Unetta's passing in 2009. They had three children: Juanita, June, and Allister. John encouraged his children in various sports, and their home was a hub of activity with play equipment he built himself.

John served as Vice-Principal for ten years and Principal for 26 years at Fivemiletown High School/Community College. He loved teaching Modern Languages and organized student trips abroad to Spain and France, later introducing ski trips to Bulgaria. He also built an outdoor swimming pool at the school, which Olympic gold medallist Mary Peters opened in 1976 and reopened as an indoor pool in 1995. John earned an MA in education, studying in the US on a scholarship. He was dedicated to improving his local community, raising funds for various projects and securing grants.

He helped renovate the "Buttermarket" into business units and community spaces and built an outdoor bowling green.

John was a former president of the Ulster Teachers' Union. After retiring, he continued to develop community projects, securing significant investments, including £822,000 for workshop units at Clabby in 2008, and funding for local sports clubs.

John had many hobbies, including playing the guitar and piano. He enjoyed family sing-alongs, dancing, and listening to various music genres. He sang bass in the church choir and loved gardening, passing on his passion for nature to his children and grandchildren.

Dr. John Burrell passed away on December 6, surrounded by his loving family at home in Cran Lodge, Fivemiletown. He was a cherished husband to the late Unetta, a devoted father, a dear brother, and a special grandfather. A Service of Thanksgiving was held on December 8 at St. John's Parish Church.

John will be deeply missed and lovingly remembered by his family and friends. "Safe in the arms of Jesus."

BALLYMENA PRIMARY SCHOOL CELEBRATES **175 YEARS** OF EDUCATION AND COMMUNITY

This year, Ballymena Primary School celebrates its 175th anniversary, with students exploring its rich history and envisioning the future.

The school first opened its doors in May 1849 with 111 students. Today, its enrollment has more than doubled. "Throughout the generations, the school has educated thousands upon thousands," said Principal Elaine Ritchie.

"The school community's reach is extensive, with former pupils venturing into various fields." Initially known as the Model Primary School, it was later renamed County Primary School, and now, Ballymena Primary School. "It has undergone numerous changes," Ms. Ritchie noted. "But it has consistently served the Ballymena community for a very long time."

The historical significance of the school is evident in its listed building.

The original front door remains intact, original building plans are displayed on the walls, and vintage desks with inkwells can be found in the hallway.

The school staff also reflect its long history. Dessie Rock, the school's crossing patrol man, is a former pupil who now has great nieces and nephews attending the school. "I know many of the children," he said. "I know their grandparents, uncles, and aunts. It's a real community feel.

"It was a good school when I attended, and it remains a good school today."

Vice-principal Gareth Bridges, another past pupil, expressed his excitement about organising the 175th birthday celebrations.

"The children have been very engaged in class activities," he said. "We've created a tile mosaic featuring selfportraits of every pupil and staff member to mark the occasion.

"We are also putting on a show - Mary Poppins - to reflect that historical era." Looking ahead, students anticipate significant changes in the next 175 years. Lilith, a P5 student, believes technology will transform teaching.

"Teachers will all be robots," she predicted. "In the future, teachers won't need to be in the school; they can be anywhere, like in Spain, with just a camera on the robots for the teacher's face."









Shannon, a P7 student, appreciates the progress already made.

"Back in the old days, teachers could hit children with canes and rulers," she said. "I'm glad that doesn't happen anymore."


A Year of Gratitude and Progress: Reflecting on My Term as President



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Belfast & Lisburn Women's Aid: Combatting Domestic Abuse Through Education and Advocacy



Belfast & Lisburn Women's Aid operates across Belfast, Lisburn, and rural South Down, supporting women and children affected by domestic abuse. They offer three emergency refuges and extensive outreach services, aiding 266 women and 164 children in refuges and 944 women with 1188 children in the community in 2020-21.

Their vision is to end domestic abuse, fostering a future where it's unacceptable and homes are safe. They challenge attitudes perpetuating violence against women, advocating for education from childhood on non-violence and gender equality. Programs engage schools and communities in protective behaviors, healthy relationships, and safety awareness.

They've partnered with Women's Aid Federation Northern Ireland, training primary school teachers in Social Guardianship and delivering workshops on gender attitudes and digital resilience in schools like St Malachy's and Hunterhouse College.

Recognising cultural shifts and persistent misogyny, they emphasise evolving forms of abuse and their impacts. They're grateful for union support funding workshops, and invite viewing of their children's animation on lockdown experiences.

They're launching a new animation in March via Belfast Domestic Abuse Partnership, exploring teen experiences in Belfast & Lisburn.

Enniskillen Model PS Commemorates 80th anniversary of D-Day

Eighty years since the D-Day landings in Normandy, the staff and pupils of Enniskillen Model Primary School marked the event with a commemorative service and a day of World War 2 activities.

The school day began with the pipes and drums of the Royal Dragoon Guards playing for the children in assembly to signal the beginning of the day's events and as a focus for the importance of the day. The entire school participated in a series of WW2 activities during the morning. The children had the chance to look at wartime vehicles and uniforms. They had the opportunity to look at and learn from a wide variety of artefacts from the time which were on display along with experts who could share their knowledge with them.

listen too that were set in war time. The children also had time to speak with current members of the armed forces about the jobs they do and roles they play today. In the afternoon there was a service of commemoration to mark the sacrifices made for our freedom on D-Day and the subsequent weeks and months. The staff and pupils were joined by many dignitaries. These included, Viscount Brookebrough, The Secretary of State for Northern Ireland - Chris Heaton-Harris, US Consul General – James Applegate and the United States Special Envoy to Northern Ireland – Joseph Kennedy III. Several P7 children then shared their recent experiences interviewing the sons of two WW2 veterans Bill Eames and JC Edmundson and the subsequent newspaper reports, diary entries and comic strip they had produced and had been published in the local press. A group of the gathered dignitaries were then interviewed about what D-Day means to them. The service concluded with a moment of reflection and prayer, led by the Padre of the Royal Dragoon Guards.

Promoting, nurturing and showcasing the Arts is a key priority for the whole school community at Hardy Memorial Primary School in Richhill, County Armagh. As part of the extra-curricular provision at key stage two, pupils have the opportunity to attend a "musical theatre" after-schools club on Monday afternoons. This year, Primary Six and Seven pupils were delighted to learn that they were being offered the chance to audition and perform in the wellknown and beloved classic, "Annie Jr". Based on the popular comic strip and adapted from the Tony Award-winning Best Musical, this popular show licensed by Music Theatre International features little orphan Annie who, with equal measures of pluck and positivity, charms everyone's hearts despite a next-to-nothing start in 1930s New York City. Annie is determined to find the parents who abandoned her years ago on the doorstep of an orphanage run by the cruel Miss Hannigan. Annie eventually foils Miss Hannigan's evil plans, finding a new home and family in billionaire Oliver Warbucks, his personal secretary, Grace Farrell, and a loveable dog named Sandy.

Since late September, P6 and P7 pupils stayed behind after school every Monday where they focused on character development; assumed American accents; perfected facial expressions; learnt choreography; and rehearsed a score of toe-tapping pieces including "It's The Hard Knock Life", "NYC" and "Tomorrow". Months of commitment and hard work by all participating pupils culminated in three matinee and evening shows in February 2024 attended by fellow pupils, staff members, governors, family and friends of the school. Staff and pupils involved in the production also felt privileged to host friends and colleagues from their strong Shared Education partnership with St. Patrick's Primary School in Armagh for a full dress rehearsal, providing an excellent audience for pupils to equip them with confidence for all of their performances. The school assembly hall transported audiences to "the city that never sleeps" by the decoration of pupil's USA themed artwork created in Nursery right through to Primary Seven. Featured pieces included yellow cab taxis, painted flags, city skylines, Annie's red dress, big apples, Empire State drawings, Statue of Liberty portraits and Central Park sketches.

A massive thank you must go to the staff team at Hardy Memorial Primary School who sourced, bought or made costumes; organised props; created set; coordinated light and sound; taught choreography or kindly gave up their evening time to volunteer and help during the performances. Thanks must foremost go to the 50+ children whose dedication, enthusiasm and talent made this production possible. This in turn impactsperformance, as being less tired means pupils are able to study and learnmore effectively.Young people are so keen to get an education, even if it involves walkinglong distances to get to school. Students in receipt of bicycles have been overjoyed. Having the bicycles benefits them to get far more from theireducation and also allows some children who have completely missed outon an education to date to enrol in school and stay there.Educators are delighted to see children arriving safely at school, on time andnot too tired to work. They can enjoy teaching and seeing the childrenthrive.In this 15th anniversary year of the Steve Sinnott Foundation why not bepart of the celebrations by ensuring access to education for students in remote rural areas - gift a bike!

Teachers at Njoren School, in the Upper River Region of The Gambia, noticed that Lamin, one of their students had holes in his shoes, and eventually had to walk bare foot. The teachers were concerned when he explained that his parents could not afford to buy any more shoes, they wore out so quickly, as he lived an hour walk away. He was a very bright boy with the potential to go on to secondary school and do well.

When Marie Antionette, General Secretary of GTU (Gambia Teachers Union), heard this story she discussed ideas with the teachers in the region and decided that many of the children needed bicycles to get to school. She contacted the Steve Sinnott Foundation to see if they could provide funds for them to buy bicycles locally to give to the children who lived far from their schools.

Now Lamin and many other children at his school have bicycles to get to school. They are not tired when they get there, their shoes are not wearing out and they are more able to concentrate at school.

As Pauline said recently at the UTU Conference: "As your Disability Champion, I hope to engage with our members, listen

to their stories, and learn from their perspectives. Working together with other colleagues, I aim to raise awareness about disability issues with our employing authorities and advocate for changes to policies and procedures." Working alongside the Irish Congress of Trade Unions, Pauline will campaign to push the Government to enhance legislation and policies that support disabled workers. As a representative of the UTU, she is committed to sharing best practices on reasonable adjustments and providing disabled members with the support they need, amplifying their voices and championing their rights. While society is beginning to recognise that discrimination against disabled people is unacceptable, Pauline, along with the UTU Central Executive Committee, knows there is still much work to be done to ensure genuine equality for their members within the education sector.

UTU SUPPORTING 40 INITIATIVES ON 3 CONTINENTS

2024 has been another pleasing year for A Ray of Hope, UNESCO Youth Ambassador for the Culture of Peace with our aim being for 40 projects to be completed in 9 countries. Just one project had to be postponed due to family commitments; however, an extra initiative was added to replace it. Thankfully for most part unlike previous years our projects were not affected by pandemics or natural disasters though war and civil unrest made difficult the lives of those involved with a few of our projects in Ukraine and Myanmar.

In India a plethora of projects relating to language development and educational field trips were completed aiming also for a positive use of leisure times. The initiatives in most cases centred around the readers in our network of Henny Penny Libraries now numbering 53.

Our two schools in Uganda required a compete redecoration for the secondary school and vocational centre, whilst the totally new nursery and primary school urgently needed furniture to cater for the ever growing popularity and a consequent demand for places. Both schools are now seen as centres of excellence for the provision of education.

. In Nepal we have 8 enthusiastic project leaders 5 of whom passed through the portals of the Metta Centre Home, an establishment for disadvantaged young ladies who took delight in perusing the pages of the UTU News in years gone by.

Now as university graduates they demonstrate a flair for the organisation of initiatives to advance the education system in Nepal including : - a modernised science laboratory refurbishment and equipment supply, increasing awareness of their important heritage especially in the culture of dance, music, costume, conservation and preservation programmes, leisure activities, educational visits to historic and religious sites. Throughout the presentations and programmes of study, "health and well being" topics have again come to the fore and these have included police seminars on internet safety, drug awareness, also aspects of mental health, building self confidence and reliance, mother/daughter health clinics, dental care, optometry testing and distribution of reading glasses.











More unusual initiative topics were In

- **Nepal --** tree planting for the future
- Nigeria -- cookery competition for students
- Philippines -- solar lighting for a vulnerable crime affected area aiming at community safety.
- Ethiopia -- provision of a more efficient water delivery system for agricultural projects

These and the usual provision of educational expendables and necessitous family supplies completed our programmes of assistance in 2024.

We are as ever most grateful for the kind and generous support proffered to us by the Ulster Teachers' Union and its members.





'HOPE FOR OUR WORLD' EVENT IN DUNGANNON

Guest speakers include Manuel Carta and Laura Hampton. A former Commissioner of the Italian Red Cross, Manuel Carta is currently serving in Belfast as an Emergency Response Volunteer. He has participated in several humanitarian missions, including earthquakes, floods, landings, and the rescue of immigrants in the Mediterranean. He is currently a multilingual instructor at the UN World Food Programme in Rome. The title of Manuel's talk is 'Where Chaos meets Hope: The role of the Disaster Manager, with a subtitle 'Field Experiences amid Natural Disasters and Community Recovery'.

Speaking ahead of the event, Manuel said, "What happens during a huge emergency, what are the changes in a city and why is it so difficult to intervene in the first moments? I will also talk about First Aid training at WFP UN." Laura Hampton is from County Armagh and has recently completed a round the world sailing adventure to benefit UNICEF, the UN Children's Fund. The Clipper Round the World Yacht Race on the UNICEF boat raised over £440,000 for UNICEF and they won the final race as well! The title for Laura's talk is 'From Orchards to Oceans – Tales of Eleven months spent circumnavigating the Globe'. In advance of the event, Laura said, "After racing 46,200 nautical miles around the globe, in some of earth's most challenging environments, I am delighted to be back home in NI and to share my story, trials and tribulations and to inspire hope for our future!"
